






One day when the Little Ponies went down to the beach they found a surprise. There, playing on their favorite rocks, were two children!

"No, no!" said Firefly. "Children are nasty. A child once threw a stone at me while I was flying. I don't like them."




"These children look kind," said Blossom. "Come on, Firefly, let's make friends with them."

The children and the Little Ponies had lots of fun. They ran races and played tag. Medley gave the children rides, and at lunchtime the children shared their lunch with the ponies.


"Tomorrow we will bring you some special treats," said the girl.



That night, when the Little Ponies were back in their cozy stable, they talked about all the fun they had had that day.


"Come with us tomorrow, Firefly," said Medley. "Then we can both give them rides."

But when she heard the boy call, "Firefly, please come and play with us," she pretended not to hear.




Firefly flew far out to sea.


Suddenly—splash! Firefly was in the water. "I hope I can swim to the shore," she said, out of breath, as a huge wave crashed over her head.




Back on the shore the Little Ponies and the children had seen Firefly fall into the water.

"Of course I will!" said Medley.




The boy ran to fetch a rope. Then he and the girl quickly climbed on to Medley's back.

Just then she heard the girl shout, "Firefly, catch this! Catch this rope! We'll pull you to shore." The girl threw the rope—and Firefly caught it!




At last Firefly reached the shore.
